




This is a Public Member Story from the Elliot Family Tree

- Gallery will have photos, if there are any or images of documents




This is a Public Member Story from the Elliot Family Tree

- This is the Grice/Lander Public Member Tree, different than the previous one.





Newspaper and Magazine Archives: Toronto Public Library, newspapers.com and, Pickering Local History Collection Digital Archive (formerly PADA).


- I'm using TO Library. You need to check out to which newspaper archives your library subscribes (likely through ProQuest).
- Top blue banner, click on ebooks and online content and then on Articles & Online Research which takes you to page shown. At the bottom are the Globe and the Star archives.



Newspapers.com is a pay for service, but I managed to obtain 107 clippings in one free week trial

- Be ready with all the names you want to search. Use quotation marks around the names.
- Practice the clipping and saving function.
 Print if necessary to be safe.
- You can do date limits



- Far right, a saved clippings from the *Windsor Star*, October 3, 1916, p 6 (showed visits to Thornhill)
- Middle, the obituary for cousin of Joan Lavis MacDonald. Maud Matthews was wife of the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario.
- Who was R.P.G. Colgrove, editor of Bess Harris book on Lawren? I had problems tracking him down, but for newspapers.com


OW TO SEND DUTIABLE GOODS TO

A RRANGEMENTS have been made by which the Cahadian war contingent Association in England, and the National Service Committee in Canada, are appointed to receive dutiable goods for Canadiani systemed in the United Kingdom, and to forward them, free of customs




Direct ProQuest Screen, without TO Library (but provided by TO library)

- Use filter "oldest first"
- Newspapers have social notes and obituaries
- You are able to set a date range to cut down on number of items (especially if it is a common name you are searching.)
- PRINT articles and double check to see that date and page number are visible.



New York Times Machine


I had trouble finding Mrs. Benjamin P. Watson who bought two Tom Thomson works directly from him in The Shack in the Rosedale Valley.

As she had moved to NYC with her husband, I tracked her down with the NYC Times

Machine — search function.

Same source provided the obituary on Feb. 9, 1980.

The Times Machine has a year function to search the entire paper for a specific date.


